Hopefully by now everyone would have checked out the new website at least once so you will know just how fantastic it looks! We are really pleased with how it has turned out and hope that everyone is enjoying this extra resource. Don't forget that it is your website too so if there is anything that you feel is missing or that could be improved please let us know. We are constantly updating the site with new information so don't forget to check it out on a regular basis.

So far the response has been pleasing with 513 visits during June & July. This means on average there were 8.41 visits per day.

Of these 513 visits, 393 were returning visitors (people who had logged on before) and 120 were new visitors.

On average these visitors viewed approximately 5 pages per visit and their average time on site was 4.05 minutes.



flea Beetle Collections

After all our careful planning and rostering the rain definitely put an end to our best laid plans! But alas from all accounts those who did eventually go Flea Beetle collecting were more than happy with their captures......

Approximately 500,000 were collected this season 50 kms from our Nursery Site. Barry collected 20,000 beetles in 2 hours at Adelong Falls! "Best season ever". This agent is looking very promising at this early stage. "Gold medal contenders!"

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Sale of State Prohibited weed in Albury

In early June it was discovered that Mexican feather grass, has been mistakenly sold by Big W throughout Victoria (North Albury store included) as part of their Mothers Day special. The grasses were displayed in wooden slat

boxes and white metal jugs.



Mexican feather grass is a Class 1 State Prohibited Weed in NSW. All remaining plants were immediately withdrawn from sale after Big W

was notified of the plants prohibited status.

Approximately 9 products were sold from Big W North Albury and since implementation of a product recall we believe 2 have been returned.

Media coverage was mostly in metropolitan newspapers along with AlburyCity printing an article in the local free paper, Midweek Express.

Hopefully by now you will have all updated your favourites list with the new web address but here it is again just in case you missed it......


The Weeds CRC has a new web address http://www.weedscrc.org.au which will remain online until approximately June 2010, after which time, it will close down.

Black Willow found in Greater Hume Shire

During May, Tom White and Neil Hibberson from Greater Hume Shire Council, found the first known infestation of Black willow in the Shire. Six or seven trees of two or three metres high (see photo: Neil Hibberson) were located during a routine foreshore inspection of the weir at Pleasure Point (south of Bowna township).



Black Willow is a Class 3 weed: must be fully and continuously suppressed and destroyed. Riverina Councils through the Riverina Black willow management plan, aim to eradicate all known

infestations of BW by 2012. The seed longevity of BW possibly being years rather than weeks is still of concern and may alter this timeframe...

Due to the rapid growth of this species it's difficult to determine age – but they could be a couple of years old.

Once ownership of the land was determined the infestation was quickly eradicated.

Murrumbidgee Farm Fair 2008




Some of the boys working hard at the Murrumbidgee Farm Fair in May this year.
